

Severe Allergic Reaction

 Difficulty/noisy breathing
 Swelling of tongue
 Swelling/tightness in throat Wheeze or persistent cough ullet Difficulty talking and/or hoarse voice

Persistent dizziness and/or collapse
Pale and floppy (young children)

Treatment



Lay the person flat.

*If unconscious, place in recovery position *If breathing is difficult, allow them to sit up

How to give EpiPen





Give EpiPen or EpiPen Jr adrenaline auto-injector. *EpiPen instructions



Call an ambulance by dialing Triple Zero (000).



Phone family/emergency contact.




Further adrenaline doses maybe given if no response after 5 minutes.



Transfer person to hospital for observation.



Hold leg still and place orange end against outer midthigh (with or without clothing).



Push down hard until a click is heard or felt and hold in place for 3 seconds.

If in doubt - give adrenaline auto-injector!

If the person becomes unconscious follow DRSABCD and call Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance.



Danger > Response > Send for Help > Airway > Breathing > CPR > Defibrillation

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
